



Legislative Updates

Most Pressing Issue: \$4,000 Pay Raise for Teachers?

- It has been widely reported that the state will provide a \$4,000 pay raise for all teachers, but that is not an accurate picture
- State formula establishes a 75/25% split of the calculated statewide cost based on a local district's Index of Taxpaying Ability
- Applying the formula results in much less than 75% actually being covered by the state
- Remainder to be funded by local school districts, with no other source of funding
- Although reported as a \$4,000 raise, the proviso clearly states that districts paying in excess of the state minimum may use its allocation at its discretion.



Legislative Updates

- \$4,000 Pay Raise for Teachers?
- The House Ways and Means Committee adopted a proviso to take all new funds for education and apply them to a new funding formula
- The proviso creates this new formula based on the number of teachers needed to attain a statewide student-teacher ratio of 11.2:1
- Included in the state's calculations were the following positions, some of which are not paid on the teacher salary schedule:
- Classroom Teachers, Special Education, Pre-Kindergarten, Kindergarten, Retired Teachers, Library Media Specialists/Librarians, Guidance Counselors, Speech Therapists, ROTC Instructors, School Nurses, Occupational/Physical Therapists, Orientation/Mobility Instructors, Audiologists, Social Workers, and Psychologists
- Not included are positions such as aides, SROs, instructional coaches, or any other personnel necessary to operate schools or districts



Update on the Implementation of Black History and Black History Resources into our Curriculum and Schools

Goal: To ensure Black History is taught year-round, not just during February, Black History Month, in our schools.

- To move toward a more inclusive and equitable society by teaching Black history as part of American history.
- Teach history and integrate Black history through our year-long curriculum to help students learn from history and move forward with new stories, creations, and experiences.
- Provide professional develop and experiences for our social studies teachers, history teachers, media specialists, and literacy coaches so that intentional lessons can be developed and taught.



The Law states in SECTION 59-29-55 Instruction on Black History

The State Board of Education shall examine the current status of the teaching of South Carolina History. By the 1989-1990 school year, each public school of the State must instruct students in the history of the black people as a regular part of its history and social studies courses. The State Board of Education shall establish regulations for the adoption of history and social studies textbooks which incorporate black history and shall, through the State Department of Education, assist the school districts in developing and locating suitable printed materials and other aids for instruction in black history. The State Board of Education shall examine curricular material for grades 1-6 to determine the level of emphasis on the relationship of agriculture and other industries to the South Carolina economy.

Tentative Implementation Timeline /Plan

- June 13: Introductory PD presentation
- June 14: We set up our Justice For All exhibit at a site provided in the district (in the morning). We invite the community, teachers (all), students, parents, stakeholders, and media to the site for the exhibit (The exhibit will include local history). We will do PD with social studies teachers, media specialists, and literacy coaches
- June 15: Teachers taken on a field study experience for the day
- Virtual: PD to engage with teachers on content implementationstrengths/challenges/support

Recommendations:

<u>Masks</u>

• I recommend that FSD3 remove the mask mandate in schools since numbers are down and DHEC guidelines support it. However, a mask can be worn and will still be available for anyone who wants to wear one.
